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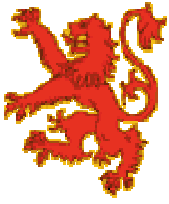

Scotland Facts

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About 55,000 residents of Scotland still speak Scots Gaelic. The rest speak English, although many speak various Scots dialects which differ markedly from Standard English.  
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Scotland's legal system is based on Roman law and was retained as part of the terms of union with England.
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Scotland maintains a separate education system. Scotland was the first country since Sparta in Ancient Greece, in which a system of general public education was implemented. It began with the Education Act of 1696.

Heavy industries such as mining, steelworks and shipbuilding once dominated in Scotland. Due to decreasing numbers of jobs in these industries Scotland's manufacturing industry has shifted to electronics and office equipment. A significant source of jobs is the North Sea oil industry, but in spite of this, unemployment is high in Scotland. Farming is dominated by stock and sheep farming in the Highlands and milk production in the south. Fishery is important as 2/3 of Great Britain's total catch is landed at Scottish ports. Tourism and whiskey production are two rapidly expanding industries.

## **Upcoming Oct. Program**

Dr. Arthur L. Down will present 'Scottish Regiments of the British Army'. Dr. Down will speak only about the Scottish Regiments on the Regular Army List. The List originally included one Guards Regiment, one Cavalry and sixteen Regiments of the Line, five Lowland and eleven Highland. The review will discuss just two aspects, the Raising of the regiment and a campaign for which a campaign medal is in his collection. British campaign medals have rank, name, and unit engraved around the rim. The campaign's have been chosen with a view to showing the many parts of the world Scottish Units fought.

St. Andrew's Day is celebrated by Scots on November 30<sup>th</sup> every year. Saint Andrew is the Patron Saint of Scotland. The Cross of St. Andrew is the flag of Scotland and is a symbol of national identity.

James VII of Scotland established the "Order of Saint Andrew", an order of Knighthood which is restricted to the King or Queen and sixteen others.

St. Andrew along with his brother Simon Peter (Saint Peter) were thought to have been fisherman in Galilee. Both became apostles of Jesus Christ. St. Andrew is believed to be responsible for spreading Christianity through Asia Minor and Greece. He was put to death by the Romans in Patras, Southern Greece by being pinned to a cross.

There are many legends of how St. Andrew became associated with Scotland and little evidence to support any of them. The popular legend of St. Rule suggests that a Greek Monk (possibly an Irish assistant of St. Columba) called St. Rule (St. Regulus) was directed by an angel, in a dream, to move the remains of St. Andrew to the "ends of the earth" for safe keeping. St. Rule removed a tooth, an arm bone, a kneecap and some fingers from the tomb of St. Andrew's in Constantinople and dutifully transported these as far as he could. St. Rule was shipwrecked in Scotland, which was close to the "ends of the earth" or the known world at the time. The bones of St. Andrew were brought ashore at a Pictish town on the East Coast of Scotland, later to be known as St. Andrews.

Another tale explaining the association of St. Andrew with Scotland is that Acca, the Bishop of Hexham, a collector of relics, brought the bones to St. Andrews in 733 AD. There was a religious centre at St. Andrews at that time, founded by St. Rule in the 6<sup>th</sup> century or by Ungus, a Pictish King, who reigned from 731 to 761.

Whichever legend is factual, the relics were placed in a chapel. The Cathedral of St. Andrews replaced the chapel in 1160 and St. Andrews became the religious capital of Scotland, hosting Medieval pilgrims who came to view the relics.

The fate of the relics of St. Andrew is unknown, but it is most likely that they were destroyed during the Scottish Reformation. The Saints, relics, and decoration of churches were expunged by the Protestant cause, propounded by Knox, Wishart, and others. The harsh simplicity of Knox's brand of Calvinism won out over Roman Catholicism during the Reformation.

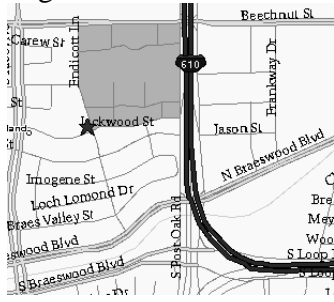
A plaque, amongst the ruins, marks the place where the relics were kept within the Cathedral at St. Andrews. The rest of St. Andrew's remains were stolen in 1210 from Constantinople and are now in Amalfi in Southern Italy. The Archbishop of Amalfi in 1879 sent a small piece of St. Andrew's shoulder blade to the re-established Roman Catholic community in Scotland.

Pope Paul VI in 1969 gave Gordon Gray, the leader of the Roman Catholic Church in Scotland, further relics of St. Andrew with the words "Saint Peter gives you his brother". Gordon Gray was in Rome to be appointed the first Scottish Cardinal since the Reformation. These relics are displayed in a reliquary in St. Mary's Roman Catholic Cathedral in Edinburgh.

## 52<sup>nd</sup> Annual Robert Burns Supper

The Heather and Thistle Society's 52<sup>nd</sup> Annual Burns Supper to be held January 22, 2005, Saturday at 7:00 PM at the Houston Marriott Westchase at 2900 Briarpark Drive, Houston. Tickets on sale to members for \$50.00 on November 1, 2004 and to non-members for \$65.00 on December 1, 2004.

The Burns Supper Planning Committee reports: The head table will seat 14 individuals and the room should hold 680 people. In addition to the ballroom, a reception room, practice room, Pipers room, Band room, Dancers room, will be needed. The band has been secured and will consist of 12 band members. The band will try to be located opposite the head table to alleviate complaints about the audio level.
